This autobiography tells the moving and exciting story of Dr Kalumbi Shangula, Namibia's Minister of Health and Social Services. He was one of hundreds of Namibians who left Namibia through Angola from 1974 to fight and prepare for the liberation the motherland. It describes the author's political wakening in the inhuman apartheid system and his hazardous journey from Namibia through Angola to Zambia with repeated arrests and escapes. The reader learns about the hard life in exile, his military training and graduation as a medical doctor in Moscow, Russia, and his work as a dedicated physician at the Peter Nanyemba Military Hospital in Angola until 1989. Shangula also vividly recounts the repatriation of former Exiles to Namibia in 1989, the joy of returning home, but also the fear

and apprehension of the returnees, their resettlement and employment in an independent country.

In this biographical narrative Erika von Wietersheim takes us back to the time between 1976 and Namibia's independence in March 1990. It is the story of a twofold emancipation: After her studies at the rather liberal University of Cape Town the young Namibian returns to her motherland to live with her husband Anton on the farm of her parents-in-law. There she is confronted with traditional apartheid structures and relationships. What can she do to change the existing situation and contribute to a more just society for the people on the farm and in the country? One answer is education. She establishes a school on the farm – initially without any outside help and against official regulations. In this way she comes into living contact with Namibian children, their parents and their culture and with time with important people of Namibia' independence movements like Hendrik Witbooi, Hage Geingob, and Anton Lubowski.

The author artfully interweaves the story of her life on the farm with political backgrounds and developments, gives us insight into the culture of the local Nama people, describes the ups and downs of everyday life on a farm and demonstrates that also among white Namibians there were serious endeavors to make Namibia a more just and self-determined society.

Through moving life histories, Akira Takada gives the !Xun of north-central Namibia a voice in their own history.

In contrast to other marginalised San minorities, the !Xun foster cooperative relationships with their neighbours, the Ovawambo, and with the state. In the face of radical social changes over the past century, they have maintained traditional hunting and gathering as a backstop but also sold their skills and labour, acquired their own farms and livestock, and enriched their child-rearing practices in changing ecological conditions. Central to their identity and resilience are their kinship and naming practices which preserve their ethnic cohesion while promoting relationships with other groups.

Contributing to an established literature on the San, Takada's book will allow detailed regional comparison on the !Kung-speaking groups of northern Namibia. Charming sketches from his notebooks give an intimate view of the anthropologist in the field.

From the early fifties, South Africa used South West Africa/Namibia as a testing ground to promote Apartheid ideology and to devise methods of countering insurgency. In these exercises a number of experts, known as ethnologists, played an important role. Linked to the government and the military they carried out research among specific ethnic groups, describing their physical characteristics, material culture, language and beliefs. Their work was used to legitimate Bantustan policy by emphasizing unbridgeable differences between people to make a national liberation movement impossible.

Gordon presents fresh evidence on crucial questions which have gone unanswered over decades. This book undermines ivory towers and raises wider moral questions concerning the role of doubt in expertise and in debunking conspiracy theories.

n September 2018 the Legal Assistance Centre (LAC) received a research grant from the United States Department of State, the purpose of which was to support the LAC to develop a series of concept chapters, with a comprehensive and updated examination of the land rights of indigenous and marginalised communities in Namibia.

This grant could not have come at a more opportune moment. Firstly, 2018 marked the 21st birthday of the LAC's Land, Environment and Development Project (LEAD). Since its inception, LEAD has supported the land and natural resource rights of Namibia's indigenous and marginalised communities through legal advice and representation, research, advocacy, capacity building and litigation. Thus,the LAC as a public interest law firm is well placed to evaluate the current state of Namibia's indigenous and marginalised communities' land rights.

Secondly, the Second National Land Conference was scheduled to take place in October 2018, hence the LAC's intention was to produce a publication that would help to maintain the momentum generated by the conference discussions. Specific resolutions were taken at the end of the conference, to which policy makers are compelled to give effect. We are hopeful that this publication will be of use to those tasked with the implementation of the 2018 Land Conference resolutions.
