This catalogue is published on the occasion of Asia Society Hong Kong Center's eponymous exhibition, Extended Figure: The Art and Inspiration of Lalan, from April 27, 2021 to October 24, 2021.

Xie Jing-lan (1921-1995), nicknamed Lalan, was an inspirational figure whose legacy lies in the art form known as integrated art, incorporating painting, music, and dance. Having received professional vocal training, Lalan studied composition and modern dance, and began her artistic career painting abstract art after relocating to Paris. Without making any sketches, Lalan choreographed the paintings with her instinct and voluntary gestures. The abstract presentation documented the transition of Lalan's inner psychology and reflected the harmonious state she had been yearning for.

Showcasing over thirty masterpieces and archival materials of her cross-disciplinary attempts, Extended Figure: The Art and Inspiration of Lalan traces the artist's transformative moments, and experimentation and introspection through the bodily focused art-making practice. As the fourth instalment in the 20th Century Chinese Female Artist Series, Asia Society Hong Kong Center (ASHK) hopes to commemorate the artist's centennial, while celebrating her significance as a pioneer of cross-disciplinary art, and her impact on merging the aesthetic of East and West.

With the aim to reconstruct Lalan's imprint on integrated art, we will collaborate with local choreographer Allen Lam to deliver a retrospective performance combining elements of music, dance, and Augmented Reality technology. In her creative process, she explores diverse possibilities within cross-disciplinary art forms, while staying true to her authentic self. Her profound desire for breaking boundaries allows audiences to stretch their imagination, and contemplate the unfamiliar in the artistic realm.

If in the first year of the pandemic, we collectively learned the compromised adequacy of remote communication, in a strange inversion, the openings in the second year afforded opportunities to re-learn, and enjoy, personal interaction again. Returning to the world has meant navigating its new, relative scale. As an editor at a magazine that reports on a vast physical geography, now situated in a region of limited travel, I have felt the territorial

constraints of Hong Kong. Yet the most visceral experiences of the past year took place in even more confined, interior contexts. I won't forget the uncanny feeling of walking into a talk in a large gallery at Tai Kwun Contemporary in April with curators Xue Tan and Raimundas Malaauskas, and choreographer-artists Scarlet Yu and Xavier Le Roy. I looked around at the socially distanced seats, and in an instant realized I had not been in a room with so many people in a long time. Later that evening, on a dark outdoor terrace, I heard from both Le Roy and Malaauskas about their experiences of three weeks in hotel quarantine: on his first day out, Le Roy was overwhelmed to the point of tears by the noise of the city, while Malaauskas recalled the overpowering scent of the lobby, so profoundly different from the recycled air of his window-locked room.

Along with the novelty of moving among the crowds in May at Art Basel Hong Kong—vast-feeling, even if half of its normal size—I became fascinated with the ubiquitous presence of rocks, or rock-like forms. There were a pair of boulders in two Relatum artworks by Lee Ufan; the rough-hewn sculptures of Huma Bhabha; Isamu Noguchi's limb-like granite forms paired with steel and wood; Sf Teshigahara's bronze sculpture recalling a scholars rock; Andrew Luk's barren landscape of cast concrete towers and spray-foam pebbles; the petrified, Rodin-esque bodies in Firenze Lai's paintings; and Luis Chan's psychedelic Chinese landscape paintings with faces emerging from the craggy landscapes of coastal Hong Kong. The mountainous islands, beaches, peaks, and peninsulas are where many of us in Hong Kong have escaped, to bathe and repose, building rock cairns in the sun.

At the end of 2018, Lam Tung Pang took the newly inaugurated high-speed rail from Hong Kong to Beijing. The artist has a fear of flying, so train travel is a necessity, in addition to being a curiosity shared by many fellow Hong Kongers.

In the nine-hour journey, Lam was most shocked when the train passes through a 20-minute long underground tunnel inside the territory of Hong Kong. These brief 20 minutes triggered a series of emotional reaction, instant recall and tangential association, which form the genesis for his creation. In the spring of 2019, Lam picked up these threads in a solo exhibition at Blindspot Gallery, curated by Abby Chen, titled "Saan Dung Gei". This eponymous book is published for Lam Tung Pang's solo at Blindspot Gallery, held in March 2019.

In addition to the artworks and installation photos, the book also includes the artist's writing in the latter half of 2019 and early 2020, titled Post-Saan Dung Gei, the curatorial statement by Abby Chen, and critical essays by art historian Dr. Alpesh Kantilal Patel and the retired Prof. Kurt Chan from The Department of Fine Arts, Chinese University of Hong Kong. The book ends with poems performed in a poetry event at the exhibition, initiated by the artist and poet Jennifer Wong, participated by writer/poet Louise Law and Tang Siu Wa.

Doctor Hu Shih was the most remarkable Chinese intellectual of the 20th century. He was the leading pioneer of vernacular, rather than classical, Chinese. It was widely adopted by schools and the media during the 1920s. His lectures at Beijing University and elsewhere, books and articles influenced tens of thousands of Chinese. From 1938-1942, he served as China's ambassador in Washington DC and played a key role in persuading President Franklin Roosevelt to enter World War Two on the Chinese side.

Jane, Frank and Mia is about three people who cross each other's paths by some unforeseen event. Jane and Frank are seemingly opposites. Jane is a Korean woman who came to the Netherlands to marry Mia's father but is now divorced and raising her 15-year-old daughter Mia. Frank is Mia's chemistry teacher and is famous for his blunt aggressive attitude. As for Mia, she has been feeling lost since her parents' divorce, and unconsciously becomes the pivot of the story as she struggles to find herself. The lives of these three become intertwined as they recognize each other's pain and the obstacles each face, such as discrimination, oppression, misunderstanding, and violence. The author writes, "As a

member of a diaspora myself, I love reading books by writers with immigrant backgrounds. War and poverty caused earlier migrations, and often there was no possibility of return. And when you can't go back, it gives the story finality, urgency. Later generations, people like myself, had more choices. They could return to their country of origin or move to yet another country for their career, for profit, or for love. I am intrigued by what makes a home and why people stay or leave. I wanted to tell a story about someone who'd left their home."

A Korean woman comes to The Netherlands to marry but subsequently is divorced, brings up her daughter alone but then meets Frank, her daughter's chemistry teacher. The lives of Jane, Frank and Mia become intertwined as they recognize each other's pain and the obstacles each face.

Swimming in Blue Shadows is a collection of five short stories and ten poems on diverse subjects and styles, written over a number of years. Each story grew out the author's personal experiences and in many ways represents a different phase of his life. The subjects of the short stories are: a wild boar hunt, a failed relationship, a Nahuatl flower seller, a bullfight, and a Belizean archaeology expedition. The poems, also, grew from personal experiences or centre on themes of particular interest to the author: AI (Artificial Intelligence), Afghanistan, COVID-19 (Coronavirus), Native Americans, love, depression, death, loss, and youthful exuberance. The title of the collection, a phrase from the first story in it, suggests the nearness of death in its innumerable and nebulous guises, pinpointing especially how the various protagonists face death, as if swimming in death's blue shadows, hidden yet there.

Entanglements: Physics, Love, and Wilderness Dreams, Jack Mayer's second poetry collection, is a poetic mélange about relationships, from sub-atomic particles to our human family; the ties that bind. Mayer, a pediatrician, poet, and hiker, explores the metaphysics of cosmology and that particularly intense entanglement, love. At the macroscopic level, Mayer's doctor poems, inspired by his pediatric practice in rural Northern Vermont, take the reader into the heart and soul of a healer inspired to find meaning in his patients' often difficult lives. Unique connections are unearthed. As a wilderness hiker and canoeist, Mayer has experienced the healing power of wilderness; the mystery of belonging to wilderness, of independence and interdependence. His wilderness poems carry us into his beloved Green Mountains on Vermont's Long Trail. On solo hikes he composes poems, then copies his first draft into the nearest shelter's logbook under his trail name, "Mountain Poet." A durable thread connects these musings on relationships, our fundamental connections. Our quest for meaning depends on relationships, the matrix within which we endeavor to understand. Life is entangled. We are entangled.
