It was only after his return to the Netherlands and his retirement in 1919 that he was able to devote his life to art.

His prolific and widely acclaimed oeuvre ranges from intriguing oil paintings to expressive woodcuts and exquisite ink drawings, which echo classical Chinese and Japanese art as well as art deco motifs.
