In January 2020 poet Ben Brown took a box of biros, an A4 ream of paper and a question to 28 YPs – young people – living in Te Puna Wai ō Tuhinapo, the Oranga Tamariki youth justice residence next door to Rolleston Prison, south-west of Christchurch.

The question was: 'How the fuck did I get here?' Over four days of kōrero and collaboration, tautoko and awahi, the young men aged 13–18 wrote their answers as poems, which have been collected in a book, with illustrations by two of the participants.

The workshop and the book are part of a Read NZ Te Pou Muramura programme. Ben Brown will deliver the 2020 Read NZ Te Pou Muramura Pānui (formerly the Book Council Lecture) in November.

Given the span and scope of the book, it is indeed a groundbreaking study where religious sensibility, either in the form of archaic gods, myths or the God of the Abrahamic religions, is traced in diametrically different genres of literature and that too across a wide expanse of history and geographical areas. The book puts religion and especially literature, in an entirely new and amazing perspective. It is indeed a very well researched book where intellectual acumen is applied to the hilt and with a scholarly touch of abiding conscientiousness. The book certainly opens hitherto unknown but historically proven indebtedness of literature to religion. Because of the magnitude of its contents and diversity of writers it discusses, it certainly qualifies to be read by scholars as well as by the general readers.

As a novelist, Northeast writer Xiao Hong has few peers. In the introduction to her maiden novel, *Lu Xun*, for whom praise had to be earned, wrote, 'Keen observations and an extraordinary writing style add considerably to [its] vividness and beauty. Its spirit is robust.' This plaudit came at the beginning of her tragically truncated career and life. Barely six years later, Mao Dun would write about another of her novels: 'Satire is here, and humour. At the start you read with a sense of relaxation; then little by little your heart grows heavier. Still there is beauty, slightly morbid perhaps but bound to fascinate you.' Less well-known, but equally impressive, is her corpus of stories, essays, and miscellaneous writing, most published during her short lifetime. The characteristics cited in the appreciations of the two titans of Republican letters are all visible in the two dozen pieces included in this volume. She was highly popular among writers and poets, who were her friends, and a host of countrymen and countrywomen, who were her fans, her reading public. She died in Hong Kong in 1942, only weeks after it fell to the Japanese.

Hong Kong enters 1980 in a restless mood. As China's doors open to foreign investment, Hong Kong's manufacturing base declines and the number of illegal immigrants continues to grow. Britain's lease of the Hong Kong New Territories will expire on 30 June 1997. Confidence in Hong Kong's future is already affected by speculation about the handover to China that this may trigger. Many Hong Kong nationals depart to live overseas. In January, the illegitimate son of Hong Kong's most powerful gangster, who is also the nephew of tycoon Yip Yee Koon, abandons his role as leader of the Wo Luen Shing Triad and returns to England where he was educated. Tony Smith's departure unleashes family secrets which almost decimate the Yip empire. At the same time, other criminal groups in the infamous Kowloon Walled City use his exit to seize power.

The author also discusses major trends in contemporary writing in Tamil in Sri Lanka, towards Sinhala - Tamil understanding and Part II is on aspects of Tamil culture in Sri Lanka.

Part II of the book is devoted to an interview the author had with Le Roy Robinson of the Faculty of Economics, University of Nagasaki, Japan. Sivakumaran has titled it as "Aspects of culture in Sri Lanka." In the course of the lengthy interview, the interviewer asks Sivakumaran whether there are translations of Sinhala and Tamil books. The interviewee says, "A few Tamil works have been translated into Sinhala and English but there are more translations of Sinhala books into Tamil."

The interview covers the entire gamut of literature, ethnic problem, cultural divide, and social mores. It should be read and understood correctly by those who wish to establish ethnic harmony between the Sinhala and Tamil communities.
